ARTISTS

The Varna Bulgarian Symphony Orchestra (Varna Philharmonic) has participated in all prestigious Bulgarian festivals and has toured Germany, the Czech Republic, Slovakia, Poland, Russia, France, Austria, Spain and Italy. It has produced many recordings for the Bulgarian National Radio and the Bulgarian National Television.


Their performances have featured famous soloists such as - David Oistrakh, Alexis Weissenberg, Pablo Kasals, Yfrah Neaman, Leonid Kogan, Yuri Boukoff, Ruggiero Ricci, Victor Tretyakov, Janos Starker, Mikhail Pletnyov, Vera Gornostaeva, Mincho Minchev, Vanya Milanova, Georgi Badev and many others. Traditionally the orchestra gives the annual opening concert of the International Music Festival "Varna Summer".

The history of the Orchestra could be traced back to 1913 when an amateur symphony orchestra was founded in Varna. In 1926 it participated with great success, conducted by Assen Naidenov, in the First Summer Music Celebrations in Varna which later developed to become the International Music Festival "Varna Summer".

In 1946 at the initiative of the conductor and violinist Proff. Sasha Popov, the Varna State Symphony Orchestra was founded in its place, which in 1968 became the Varna State Philharmonic. During the first years of the orchestra's existence, its Principal Conductors were Ruslan Raichev, Vassil Stefanov, Yosko Yosifov and Konstantin Iliev.

The greatest credit for the professional growth of the orchestra must be attributed to conductors Emil Glavanakov, Ivan Marinov and Yordan Dafov. Since the beginning of 2000, the Principal Conductor is Stanislav Oushev.

The orchestra has an extensive repertoire which includes symphonies, cantatas and oratorios from the mainstream repertoire, as well as many works by Bulgarian composers from several different generations.



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Martin Georgiev - Conductor and Composer

Martin Georgiev is an alumnus of the Royal Academy of Music in London, where he has completed his Postgraduate degree in Conducting with Colin Metters, Sir Colin Davis and George Hurst, for which he was awarded the Fred Southall Memorial Prize, and scholarships by the ABRSM, the Royal Academy of Music, National Culture Fund of Bulgaria, the Municipality of the City of Varna and St Cyril and Methodius International Foundation.

He is currently completing his PhD in Composition at the Royal Academy of Music, with principal supervisor Dr Philip Cashian and subsidiary supervision with Sir Peter Maxwell Davies and Julian Anderson amongst others, which is supported by the Wingate Foundation, Alan&Nesta Ferguson Trust and Sir Richard Stapley Educational Trust.

He is the Composer in Residence to the City of Heidelberg - 'Komponist für Heidelberg 2012I13" where his newest Symphonic work The Secret, commissioned by the City and its General Music Director, Yordan Kamdzhalov, will be premiered in 2013 by the Heidelberg Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by the author. In 2013 he will also work as cover conductor for the Royal Ballet at ROH Covent Garden, London. He has worked as a composer and/or conductor with the BBC Symphony Orchestra, Brussels Philharmonic, Bulgarian National Radio Orchestra, National Orchestra of Belgium, London Bloomsbury Opera, Aldeburgh Music, the Azalea Ensemble, Sofia National Philharmonic Orchestra, Varna Philharmonic, Ensemble Musiques Nouvelles, Forte Quartet. Stankov Ensemble.

He is a recipient of numerous awards for composition, conducting and percussion,



including the Grand Prize for Symphonic Composition of the Sofia National Philharmonic Orchestra in 2003, a symphonic commission prize in memory of Sir Henry Wood by the Royal Academy of Music in 2011 and the UBC Golden Stave Award in 2004. His works have featured three times in the selection of the International Composers' Forum TACTUS in Brussels, Belgium - in 2004, 2008 and 2011, and he was a finalist for the Hindemith Prize of the Schleswig-Holstein Music Festival in Germany, 2009-10. His works have been performed in the United Kingdom, Bulgaria, USA, France, Germany, Belgium, The Netherlands, Japan, Mexico, Canada, Greece, Israel and Italy,

Vania Vatralova-Stankov - Soprano

Vania Vatralova-Stankov has established herself as one of Europe's leading young sopranos. In the 2011/2012 season, Vania perfomed the roles of Michaela (Carmen) and Violetta (La Traviata) at Opera Varna to great critical acclaim. Other recent highlights include a concert with the English Chamber Orchestra at the Cadogan Hall in January 2012 as part of the London Festival of Bulgarian Culture, and a performance of Anna Bolena with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra at the Tower of London Festival in the title role.

Vania has performed with many other orchestras including the Sofia Philharmonic, Madrid Players and Valencia Baroque Orchestra at major concert halls throughout Spain, Bulgaria and the UK, including the Palau de la Musica in Valencia and the National Palace of Culture in Sofia.

Vania Vatralova-Stankov has given numerous recitals at festivals including the Belcanto Dordrecht Festival in the Netherlands and Barcelona's Peralada Festival. She has performed many roles with Swansea City Opera throughout Wales, and has appeared as Donna Anna (Don Giovanni), Fiordiligi (Cosi fan tutte), and Michaela (Carmen) with the Royal Opera School in Madrid, and as Violetta (La Traviata), Rusalka and Anna Bolena with the Welsh National Opera School.

Vania has participated in masterclasses with such eminint artists as Montserrat Caballé, Renata Scotto and Mirella Freni, and was a finalist at the Premio Caruso Competition in Italy and the Logroño International Competition in Spain, where she was awarded the competition's Scholarship. Vania Vatralova-Stankov is a recipient of numerous prizes including the Donizetti Award from the Welsh National Opera School for two years in a row, and awards from the Belcanto Festival and the Spanish Ministry of Education.



Vania graduated in Bulgaria and Spain with the highest qualifications in both violin and singing, and she completed her Postgraduate opera studies at the Royal Opera School in Madrid under the tutelage of Professor Ana Fernaud.

Equally passionate about chamber music, Vania formed The Stankov Ensemble with her husband, the renowned violinist Ivo Stankov

Vania Vatralova-Stankov has recorded for all the major Spanish and Bulgarian television and radio channels, including BNR, RTVE, Antena 3, Canal 9 and TV3. Vania's CD recordings include Misterio de Eiche, a spectacle declared by UNESCO as "Patrimony of the Humanity Treasure", and, more recently, the highly acclaimed Operatic Favourites with the Sofia Symphony.



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The Music department draws proudly on its legacy of Ralph Vaughan Williams and Gustav Holst, both teachers at JAGS, in its practical and creative class music-making, enriched by the teaching of over 30 visiting music teachers. There are tours, competitions and concerts too (over 30 last year).


Music scholarships are offered to girls entering JAGS at 11 and 16. Music Exhibitions may also be awarded to girls who show promise.

Heidi Pegler – Choir Conductor Leigh O'Hara – Director of Music

"It is of great importance that the parents should understand that we intend to make the music of the School of more than ordinary merit" (Miss Frances Gray, the school's first High Mistress in a letter to the Governors in 1904).

It was with such high ambitions for music in mind that Frances Gray appointed the distinguished composer Gustav Holst as the school's first director of music in 1905. He was to remain in post until his death in 1934 and most of his greatest works, including The Planets, were written during this time.

Following Holst, the school has been fortunate in having a succession of distinguished musicians (whether as composer or conductor) to lead the department, including Ralph Vaughan Williams, Herbert Howells, John Gardner and Hilary Davan Wetton.

The music department currently consists of conductor and pianist Leigh O'Hara as the newly appointed director of music; Mark Wilderspin as assistant director of music and composer in residence; Dr Corissa Gould as academic music teacher and archive specialist; four music heads of section (responsible for singing, strings, keyboard and woodwind, brass & percussion); a music department manager and around forty-five peripatetic music teachers, many of whom are leading professionals in their field.

The department is housed in an historical listed building dating from 1913 and designed to Holst's original specifications. It includes a recently re-furbished 220 seater recital hall (The Singing Hall), The Holst Room used for academic teaching, a recording studio and sixteen sound-proofed individual teaching rooms. Large-scale concerts take place in the beautiful setting of the school's Great Hall.

Music plays a central and much valued role in the cultural life of the school. Pupils of all levels and abilities are encouraged to participate in extra-curricular musical activities and a very high proportion of the girls take music lessons (over 80%). There are three main orchestras, four choirs and numerous other wind and string ensembles as well as chamber music and close harmony groups. Pupils from the school are regularly represented at the highest levels in the National Youth Orchestra, the London Schools' Symphony Orchestra, the National Children's Orchestra and the National Youth Choir of Great Britain. A number of pupils also study at the Junior Departments of the London music colledes.

The choir performing today are an auditioned group of girls from the top four years of the school. Conducted by head of singing, Heidi Pegler and accompanied by head of keyboard, Alexis White, Paulina Voices is a chamber choir committed to working towards events outside of St Paul's.

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PROGRAMME NOTES

Programme notes and composers' biographies by Martin Georgiev

Pancho Vladigerov (1899-1978)

Pancho Vladigerov started his international career as a real star at the age of 21 when his Violin Concerto No.1 was premiered by Gustav Haveman and the Berlin Philharmonic, conducted by Fritz Reiner in 1920. Only A few days later he performed as a pianist his 1st Piano Concerto with the Berlin Philharmonic.

A publishing contract with Universal Edition followed two years later and his works were performed worldwide, by Vienna Philharmonic, London Symphony Orchestra, Philadelphia Orchestra, Moscow Philharmonic, David Oistrakh, Eugene Ormandy, Evgeny Svetlanov, Vladimir Ashkenazy, Alexis Weissenberg (who's first prominent piano teacher was Pancho Vladigerov), amongst many others.

For a decade Vladigerov was the Music Director of the Deutsches Theater in Berlin, during the tenure of Max Reinhardt as its Artistic Director, creating original music for many of Reinhardt's premieres. In the wake of the World War, being in danger due to his Jewish roots (he was related to Leon Pasternak), Vladigerov returned to his home country of Bulgaria, where he was to live and work until the end of his life.

He taught Composition and Piano at the Sofia State Conservatoire, (later to become National Academy of Music), which today is named after him, and the majority of his pupils became the most prominent Bulgarian composers of the next generation. Thus he is now considered the most influential Bulgarian composer of all times.



However, as a consequence of the World War, the Cold War and the following extended period of turmoil in his native Bulgaria, his compositions gradually fell into oblivion internationally and today have retained their popularity only in his home country.

Author of 5 Piano Concertos, 2 Violin Concertos, 2 Symphonies, Opera, Ballet and many other orchestral, chamber, solo and vocal works, he is represented in tonight's programme with one of his cycles of miniatures a genre in which he was particularly successful, with his symphonic *Bulgarian Suite* op. 21 having been performed worldwide, from Philadelphia to Moscow to London to Sofia.

'Shumen' Miniatures were composed in 1934, initially for Piano, and were later orchestrated by the author. These charming miniatures are characteristic impressions from the town of Shumen, situated in the district of Varna in Bulgaria, where the composer spent most of his youth. (He was born in a Zürich hospital, but came back to Shumen with his parents a few weeks later and lived there for his first 17 years).

The miniatures were dedicated to his son Alexander, who was born shortly before the work was composed, and was to become another prominent Bulgarian composer.

The 'Shumen' Miniatures are infused throughout with melodies of Bulgarian folksongs (as in Lullaby and Song), and the typical irregular rhythms of Bulgarian folk dances, as the complex irregular metric combinations in Village Dance or the continuous 7/8 meter in Rachenitsa. Even the music box from the eponymous piece seems to play a tune from a Bulgarian Horo dance.

Programme notes and composers' biographies

Vassil Kazandjiev (1934)

Composer and conductor Vassil Kazandjiev is one of the leading composers of the Bulgarian 20 Century avantgarde, and a most prominent figure in Bulgarian musical life in the second half of the century.

Kazandjiev was not at ease with the totalitarian authorities due to his avant-garde style of composition, but nevertheless, he received a laureate's prize from the jury of the Sixth International Youth Festival in Moscow in 1957, chaired by Shostakovich, awarded for his Sinfonietta for large orchestra.

That helped him to maintain his uncompromising approach to style while establishing himself as a forefront figure in Bulgarian musical life. A student of Pancho Vladigerov, Konstantin Iliev and Dobrin Petkov, Vassil Kazandjiev absorbed the highest values of artistry from the preceding generation of Bulgarian composers and conductors and developed them to new strengths.

Founder and music director of the Sofia Soloists Chamber Ensemble, and principal conductor of the Bulgarian National Radio Orchestra, Kazandjiev gave numerous premieres and recorded a vast amount of new works. His recordings were released and broadcast worldwide. With the Sofia Soloists he toured Europe, North America, Asia and Africa, achieving high recognition for Bulgarian music during the difficult period of the Cold War.

As a composer he was stylistically uncompromising, while at the same time some of his works established an unprecedented presence for this style at the stage, the media and the public consciousness in Bulgaria during his heyday.

The cycle of miniatures *Pictures from Bulgaria* was composed in 1971 for one of the international tours of the Sofia Soloists. In it Kazandjiev's particular brand of Aleatorics and other new techniques of the time meet Bulgarian Chant, Folksong and Dance in a unique fusion, characteristic for his style and seasoned by his masterly work with timbre and atmosphere.

The cycle exists in two versions - the original, which is performed tonight, and a second version for large symphony orchestra. The present selection includes four of the six movements



Most notable in this respect are *Pictures from Bulgaria* and *The Living Icons* (despite their Christian symbolism which was another problematic aspect in a period of state endorsed atheism and persecution of Christianity).

These two works are also most well known internationally, as they were performed on tour by the Sofia Soloists, conducted by him, and later by Plamen Djouroff, and LP recordings of these works were distributed worldwide in the 1970s and 1980s. Kazandjiev's five Symphonies are landmark works in Bulgarian contemporary-classical music, while his film scores reached millions in Bulgaria through some of the most admired movies of a generation.

Rila Monastery is inspired by the most important Bulgarian centre of Christianity up to the present day, established by St John of Rila in the 10th Century, which also established itself as the most prominent centre for Bulgarian Chant. Motives from Rila Chant are intertwined with atmospheric sonorities in an intriguing aleatoric context.

The second movement is inspired by the Bagpipe and the Bagpipers, particularly popular in Bulgarian folk music practice. *Folksong* is build throughout from a single tune that of the famous Bulgarian folksong *Polegnala e Tudora*. The last movement is inspired by the ritual dance of the Kukeri, who dance with many cowbells hanging from their clothes, which makes a characteristic rattling noise.

Programme notes and composers' biographies

Dimitar Nenov (1901-1953)

An impressive polymath: composer, pianist and architect, Dimitar Nenov was one of the leading Bulgarian composers in the earlier 20 Century.

Highly educated in Music and Architecture in Bulgaria, Germany and Italy (in all three countries he graduated and specialised in both subjects), Nenov was active in both fields and established himself amongst the foremost intellectuals in Bulgarian cultural life in the first half of the century.

As a pianist he toured Europe and recorded piano works in Bulgaria, Germany and Hungary.

Unfortunately all his recordings as a pianist for the Bulgarian National Radio were deleted in the second half of the century, on orders by an official from the communist party. He was a Piano professor at the Sofia State Conservatoire and taught several of the most important figures of the Bulgarian avant-guarde, most notably Lazar Nikolov and Trifon Silyanovsky.

As a composer he developed a highly original style and created 2 Symhonies, Piano Concerto, 2 oratorios, orchestral, vocal, chamber and piano works. He was also the first music director of the Sofia Radio (later - Bulgarian National Radio), and the creator of its orchestra, which later became the Bulgarian National Radio Orchestra.

Five 'Rhodope' Folksongs were created by Nenov for that orchestra and its radio broadcasts, in 1937-8.

Working with Bulgarian folksongs is typical for many Bulgarian composers, from the 19th Century up to the present day. That approach falls somewhere in between arrangement and composition, and in the Bulgarian language there is a particular word for it (οδραδοτκα), as it is different from both composition and arrangement, and yet it incorporates elements from both of them.

The most famous examples of this genre worldwide are the songs performed by Le Mystère des Voix Bulgares, which represent a movement initiated by the composerethnomusicologist Philip Koutev, which movement works with the original vocal production and combines it with various classical and 20 Century techniques in composition.

Meanwhile, the earliest examples by composers like Dobri Christov - a pupil of Dvorak's and a teacher of Vladigerov's, are classical choral settings where the folksong meets the tonal romanticism. Nenov's Folksongs are much earlier examples then Koutev's, yet later than Christov's. They are masterly vocal-orchestral compositions in the classical symphonic-operatic tradition, where the composer, paradoxically, both keeps the songs unaltered in the vocal part, and yet creates highly inventive symphonic tone poems around them.

His orchestral settings are at times striking with both great economy of means and unique personal style. The folksongs that are the kernels of the compositions are from the Rhodope Mountains in South-West Bulgaria - the birthplace of the legendary Thracian musician, Orpheus. Their themes are typical for many Bulgarian folksongs - love, hatred, marriage, the Ottoman oppression and the revolution against it.

However, my opinion is that translating the texts would not succeed to convey truly neither the atmosphere, nor the intrinsic meaning of the archaic Rhodopean Bulgarian dialect, or the mindset that created these texts, which are difficult to comprehend even for an average contemporary Bulgarian speaker. Therefore I prefer to leave Nenov's magnificent tone poems to tell the stories, and I give the titles in Bulgarian here.



Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958)

In the history of British music composer Ralph Vaughan Williams is remembered as one of the greatest of all times, not only with his truly substantial output of 6 Symphonies, 5 Operas, 5 Ballets and a great amount of orchestral, chamber and vocal works, which are the result of his artistic activity spanning over sixty years, but also most importantly, this work of a musical giant is marked by a deeply personal style which is much loved by musicians and audiences alike.

One of the most notable, and noted facets of this style springs from his deep knowledge of, and love for the English folksongs and carols.

That is also the deep connection between the vastly differing styles of all four composers in tonight's programme. And in that connection with folksongs, carols and chants, there is something that is not only charming, touching, loveable, but also something deep, natural and supernatural; eternal...

Folks Songs of the Four Seasons, composed in 1950, is amongst Vaughan Williams' last works. It was commissioned by the National Federation of Women's Institutes for their first Singing Festival in 1950, when it was premiered by the Women's Institute forces joined by the London Symphony Orchestra, under Sir Adrian Boult at the Royal Albert Hall. It is based on folksongs collected by the composer between 1904 and 1910, and also includes songs from the collections of his friends Lucy Broadwood, Cecil Sharp and George Butterworth.

In this work, just as in all other works in tonight's concert, one could not speak about 'an arrangement', but rather, of subtle composer's work where folksong and composition co-exist in an ingenious symbiosis.

The folksongs and carols comprising the cantata are grouped in a particularly notable way, following the four seasons of the year and its eternal cycle which is in the very essence of life on our planet, and is essential for ritual and folksong in all world cultures. In the composer's own words: 'The subject of our folk-songs, whether they deal with romance, tragedy, conviviality or loyalty, have a background of nature and its seasons'.



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
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Cadogan Hall Etiquette and Information
